By the end of this unit, the children will have developed an awareness of the United Kingdom and its surrounding areas, including the location of capital cities and seas. The children will develop their mapping skills, using atlases and globes.	By the end of this unit, the children will have gained an understanding of the different areas of the United Kingdom and the way in which they were impacted by invaders and settlers.	By the end of this unit, the children will have developed their understanding of sustainability and the environmental issues facing the world. They will look closely at the ways in which they can protect and sustain our environment.	By the end of this unit, the children will have been given the opportunity to use digital mapping to look at how the area has changed over time since the Victorian Era.
