



PE and Sport Premium Funding 2022-2023

The government has provided additional funding of £150 million per annum since September 2013 to improve provision of physical education and sport in primary schools. The funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools. Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1 to 6. Schools with sufficient eligible pupils receive £16,000 and £10 per pupil (347 eligible pupils).
